The very first time I met Celia, I was recently married and living in London. I visited my parents, who lived in Bubbenhall, and when I went to church with them, there was this new young vicar and his wife, valiantly looking after five young children during the service.

People in our communities at Ryton and Bubbenhall remember Celia with great affection in her many roles: as a wonderful mother and supportive wife: as “Vicar’s wife”: Branch Leader of the Mother’s Union, organiser of the thriving Guides company, Sunday School teacher, supporter and teacher at the village school,- especially when the education authority wanted to bus the 8-year-olds over to Stretton, and the village united to set up the independent Middle School:- as comforter and unfailing supporter of our vicar Trevor, especially when his health began to fail towards the end of his life.... The list is a long one, and each of you who knew her will have your own memories to add. But most of all we shall remember her for her friendship and love to each one of us.

Celia was a “people person”, who loved and valued each individual person.

When she eventually moved to Leamington after Trevor’s death, she maintained a lively interest in our village life, and kept in touch with many Ryton and Bubbenhall friends . After the move, she became a faithful and active member of St. John the Baptist Church, South Leamington, and was sustained until her death by her own lively Christian faith, by the fellowship of that church community and by the ministry of its parish priest. Her children say: “one thing about Mummy, that in essence was her very being, was her incredible unstinting faith. A faith that was with her always and one that shaped her in being the kindest and most loving person that she was.”

We give thanks for her and for our memories of her.

For your diary: Sunday, April 8: Annual Parish Meeting/Annual Parochial Church Meeting

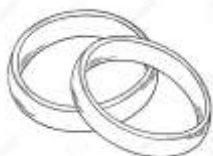
Flowers in church

Children in church.



Although we do not at present have the resources to run regular services for children at Bubbenhall, we love having children in our churches, and there is **always provision for them at the 9.30 a.m. services at Ryton.** All families with babies and children are sure of a warm welcome whenever they can join us.

All Ryton Sunday morning services start at **9.30 a.m.**, and the pattern is:

2nd Sunday in every month: Village Worship.

The most informal of all our services.

We start in the Church Centre (warm and welcoming) with workshop activities for children, and coffee, puzzles and chat for grown-ups to get to know one another.

At about 10.00 we move into church for a short and child-centred service.

There is no need to be there on the dot of 9.30- people drift in as soon as they can make it.

4th Sunday in every month: Family Service.

An all-age service of readings, songs and activities with everybody young and old in church together.

Children always participate in the readings/ drama sketches etc. and sometimes people bring instruments to accompany the songs. (and any other musicians among you and your children would be very welcome to join them)

Tea/coffee and cake after the service in the Church Centre.

1st and 3rd Sundays in every month: Parish Communion with Sunday School.

Tea/coffee and the chance to socialise after every service. Children start the service in church with their parents, and after the first hymn go out for Sunday School activities in the Church Centre, returning to receive a blessing at the time of Communion. Parents are welcome to accompany their little ones to Sunday School and stay with them if they lack confidence at first.

At these services, we also have a robed choir which includes older children (aged about 8 and upwards) and teenagers: anyone whose son/daughter likes singing might consider encouraging them to join the choir. 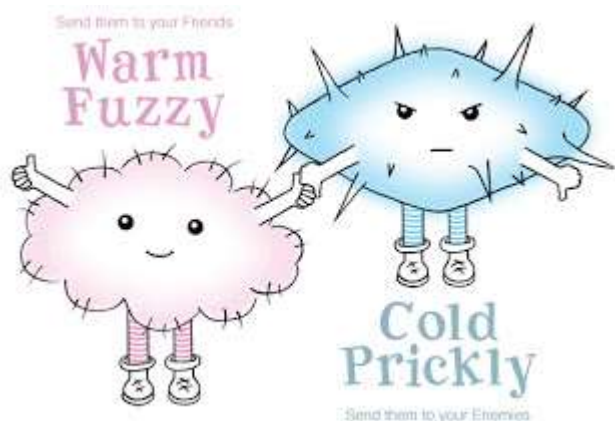


Families from Bubbenhall are especially welcome at all these services.
