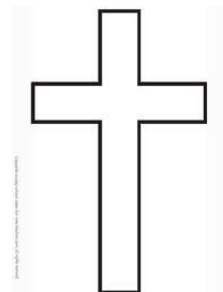

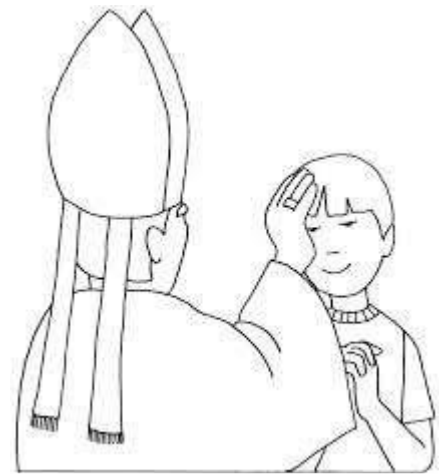

Children in church.

The information below outlines our normal pattern of services- to be resumed as and when more normal times return! Until then, please bring your children to our Family Services on Zoom: every 2nd and 4th Sunday in the month. Colouring and activities sheets for all ages are sent out by email before all family services.



Although we do not at present have the resources to run regular services for children at Bubbenhall, we love having children in our churches, and there is always (when circumstances once more allow) provision for them at the

9.30 a.m. services at Ryton. The information below outlines our normal pattern of services- to be resumed when more normal times return!

All families with babies and children are sure of a warm welcome whenever they can join us. All Ryton Sunday morning services start **at 9.30 a.m.**, and the pattern is:

2nd Sunday in every month: Village Worship.

The most informal of all our services.

We start in the Church Centre (warm and welcoming) with workshop activities for children, and coffee, puzzles and chat for grown-ups to get to know one another.

At about 10.00 we move into church for a short and child-centred service. There is no need to be there on the dot of 9.30- people drift in as soon as they can make it.

4th Sunday in every month: Family Service.

An all-age service of readings, songs and activities with everybody young and old in church together.

Children always participate in the readings/ drama sketches etc. and sometimes people bring instruments to accompany the songs. (and any other musicians among you and your children would be very welcome to join them)

Tea/coffee and cake after the service in the Church Centre.

1st and 3rd Sundays in every month: Parish Communion with Sunday School.

Tea/coffee and the chance to socialise after every service. Children start the service in church with their parents, and after the first hymn go out for Sunday School activities in the Church Centre, returning to receive a blessing at the time of Communion. Parents are welcome to accompany their little ones to Sunday School and stay with them if they lack confidence at first.

At these services, we also have a robed choir which includes older children (aged about 8 and upwards) and teenagers: anyone whose son/daughter likes singing might consider encouraging them to join the choir. Thought for the Month: Fr. Paul O'Reilly tells this story:

“As you probably know, there are many stories about Mother Teresa. Some of them I’m confident are true; others I’m really not so sure about. But this one was told to me by a nun, a Mother Teresa nun with an Australian accent - a real “Strine” accent, so I really like to think is a true story.



About 30 years ago, a young Australian woman called Margaret was travelling around India on the hippy trail, seeking - as she put it - spiritual enlightenment. And one day, when she was in Calcutta, she was walking through a little dark alley a long way off the main thoroughfare, when she came across a small boy who looked about 5 years old and, apparently, had been beaten and left

to die in the gutter. His little body was covered with bruises, bites, cuts, sores and all kinds of injuries. But he was still alive. She didn't know what to do, but she had to do something. She couldn't bear to leave him there. So, she did the only thing she could think of - she brought him to Mother Theresa's hospice in Calcutta. And she asked if she could bring the child into the house. And that was fine. So she carried him in and laid him down on one of the beds.

And then she went away back to her hostel. But she didn't sleep well that night. She needed to know if he was going to be all right. So the next morning, she went back to see him. He was still very ill. And it just didn't feel right to leave him there and go away. So, she asked if she could stay for a day or two and help to look after him. And so she did. She nursed the child devotedly day and night. And, after about a week, as the child started to improve, she began to help with nursing the other sick people in the hospice. Days became weeks. After about three months, Mother Theresa came to her while she was working and - without any unnecessary preliminaries – simply asked her whether she had ever considered entering religious life.

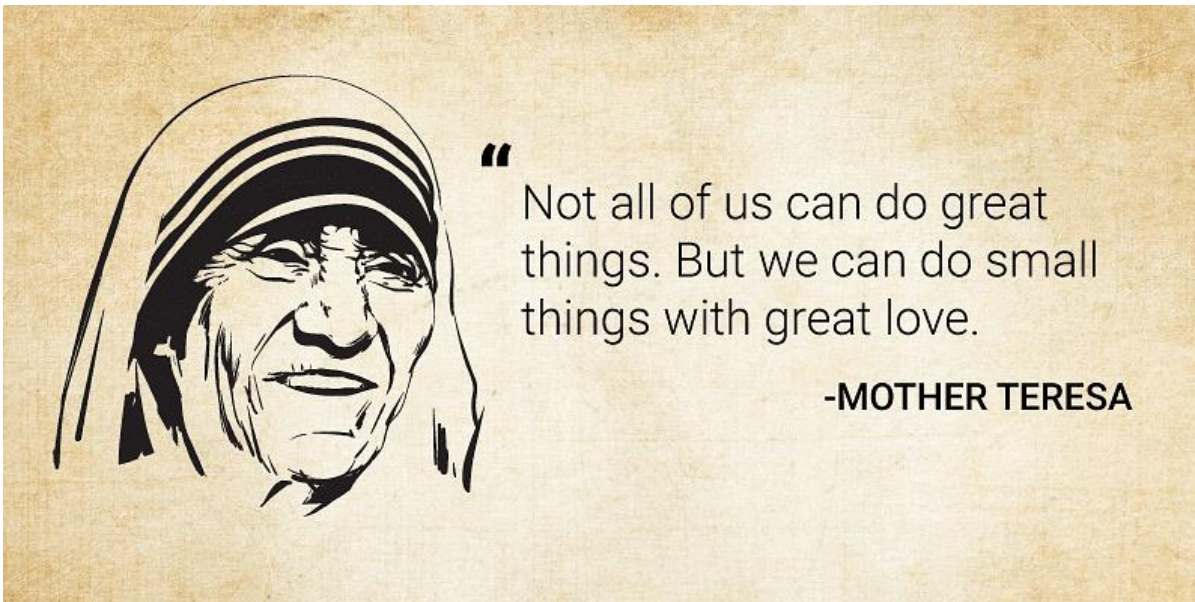
Margaret was very taken aback, because she knew that it was very unusual for Mother Theresa to ask people directly to join her congregation of nuns. But she said. "Well, you see, I'm actually not at all religious. Both my parents are atheists. I've never been to church in my life. I've never even been baptised. I'm not sure I'm really the sort of person that becomes a nun."

"Oh," said Mother Theresa. "Don't worry about that. When the actions of the heart are right, the words of the mind will follow."

To do the will of our Father in heaven is not primarily about what words we say, what promises we make, or even perhaps which (if any) Church we attend. All of those things are important: they are the ways in which we feed our life in Christ. But what is ultimately important – what ultimately reveals whether or not we are committed to the love of God – is whether we go and do the work that our Father has asked of us. We may not enjoy it; we may curse; we may do it reluctantly; and we may wish that the Father had asked something different of us – but we do it because God's love is inside us and this is what He has asked of us.

Actions speak louder than words. Saint Ignatius Loyola says: "love shows itself more in actions than in words".

Let us pray that God's love in us may show itself at least as much in action as in words. When the actions of our hearts are right, the words of our minds will follow.

Wroth Silver ceremony.



Wroth Silver: So what's it all about?

The ancient Wroth Silver tradition, which dates back nearly 850 years to 1170, is held every year on Martinmas Eve. It sees the Duke of Buccleuch - also known as the steward of the Ancient Hundred of Knightlow - sending his agent to collect taxes from the 25 surrounding parishes. The amounts each parish has to pay varies from half a pence to 11.5p. A total of 46p is raised, which once represented a princely sum.

If a parish defaulted on their payment, they were fined a white bull with red nose and ears. Based on feudal law, the ceremony was once a common sight across the land and noted in the Domesday Book. It died out with the advent of local government and modern methods of collecting taxes.

The ceremony is now carried out purely to keep the ancient tradition alive, and is widely regarded as Britain's oldest surviving ceremony.

Wroth Silver is kept alive by David Eadon, a grandfather-of-six from Rugby, who has now been to 80 consecutive ceremonies after first going as a young boy. Also there was Rachel Gladstone-Brown, the Duke's agent, along with representatives from the 25 parishes, and the mayor of Rugby. Mr Eadon said: "I've been every year since 1938, when I was just four. My family have been every year since 1904. "It's really perpetuating an old ceremony which exists nowhere else in the country. It's enjoyable. It's rather nice for me and sentimental because my parents and grandparents used to go. "My earliest memory is being taken in a Morris Eight car to the ceremony which takes place on Knightlow Hill.

"I've been organising it at a local level since 1965, when my father could no longer go. It needs people like us because it is a ceremony from 1,000 years ago."

What is the hollow stone?

It is thought to be the base of an ancient stone cross that's long since gone.

Where exactly is it held?

The ceremony is held in the field on Knightlow Hill on the A45 between Ryton-on-Dunsmore and Stretton-on-Dunsmore, on the left, on top of the hill just east of the Wolston/Ryton roundabout. Anyone can attend.

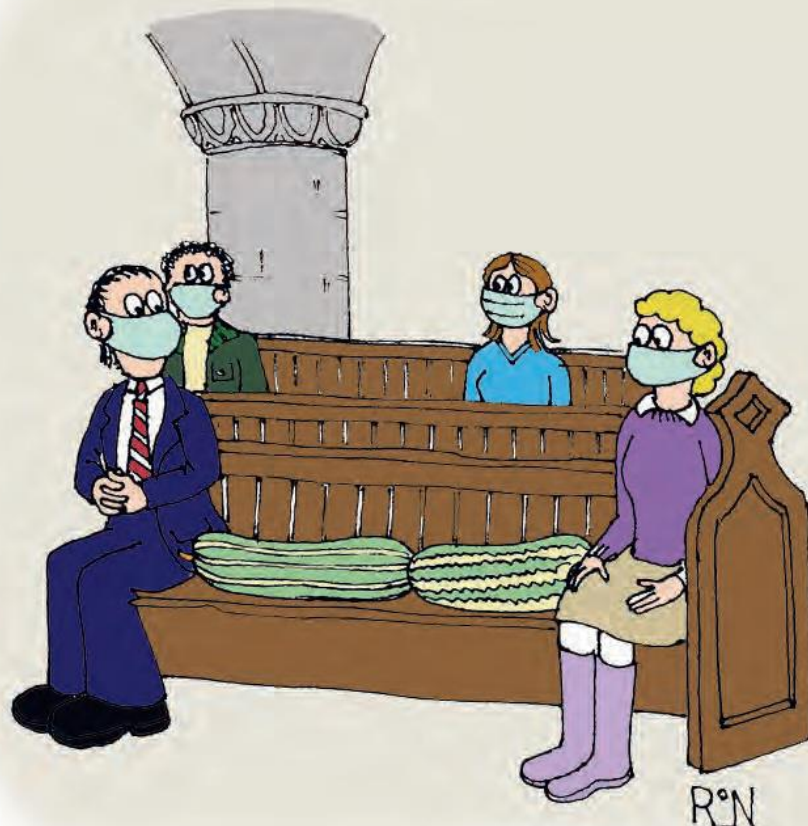
