Now that we have no parish priest, we are having to implement a temporary/ interim schedule of services. We are aiming to hold one service each Sunday in each church, but we have had to suspend weekday services until further notice. The schedule above shows what services we shall endeavour to hold in each parish, but we are finding it extremely difficult to recruit clergy to officiate.

You will see that the times of the services are mainly what you are used to, (but note changed times on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month at Bubbenhall) and we shall be continuing to offer coffee and tea after the services where this is customary. If a priest is unfortunately not available, an authorised Service of the Word (with hymns and refreshments) will be offered instead of Holy Communion. We shall give as much notice as possible in the weekly email update and on noticeboards.

We thank all those people who are working so hard to keep our churches up and running during the time when we shall be without a Rector/ Vicar. Please support them in their efforts by volunteering, coming to community events, and most importantly- by coming to church!
