As this is the close season I thought I would let you know a little about the history of the Club's Ground. Hunningham Cricket Club was established approximately 75 years ago. For the last 60 years it has resided at the ground where it currently plays, situated behind the Red Lion Public House in Hunningham.

The ground in the early 1930's was not quite like it is today. In fact many people would find it remarkable to learn that much of the time cricket was played in far from ideal conditions.

Indeed the competition was as much with the outfield as against the opposition. It was not unusual to play with the grass in the outfield in excess of 18 inches long, disguising as it did hidden traps. These traps were the handy work of the clubs co-tenants, various herds of cattle. Many an unsuspecting player came to grief in pursuit of a ball in the outfield. Successfully dodging the thistles only to land in a cow-pat deposited between the morning clean up and the start of play. The unfortunate individual usually ended up

being banished to the boundary for his pains. He was to be avoided in the "Red Lion" later because of his unusual taste in perfume "Essence de Friesian".

In 1984 the ground was donated to the club by Mrs Wright, who lives on the Fosse near Offchurch, by a Deed of Gift. To comply with the Deed, sport has to be played on the ground at least once a year, if not the land will be donated to the church.

Once the ground was allowed to be fenced off things began to

improve, although the fence still retains a number of stiles along its perimeter to allow the fielder to climb into the adjacent field to retrieve the ball when it has been hit for six. The cricket square has always been very reliable and is the envy of more fashionable clubs.

In the last few years the ground and facilities have improved tremendously but it still retains the character of a village cricket ground with it's wooden pavilion. Last year an all weather batting facility was added and in the spring of 1999 an all weather wicket will be put down on the edge of the batting square. This will enable more Youth Team games to be played, and we are to increase our support of youth cricket by the addition of an Under 15 side. To improve our training of the Youth team, by April 1999, we will have four Warwickshire Cricket Club trained coaches.

We have been especially pleased this year as six of the Youth team have been retained by Warwickshire C.C. for winter coaching. We are looking forward to next year with eager anticipation, and as soon as the Christmas Pudding has gone down we will be into our indoor training at Princethorpe College. Please all you budding junior cricketers, come along and join us, all are welcome.

Bubbenhall Junior Football



SNIPPETS OF VILLAGE HISTORY

We now move on to the 1700's with some interesting dates of various government orders which affected the village life of Bubbenhall.

1601-1834

Poor Law - the parish has to keep details of money collected and how it was spent.

1662

Act of Settlement, when a parish was responsible for it's inhabitants.

1795

Removable order- the overseer issued a settlement certificate to each Parishioner.

1734-1836

You had to be married in an Anglican church which kept two registers, i.e. marriages and deaths

Up to 1800

A school master had to be licensed by the Bishop

1809

National Vaccination centre was set up

1830's

Village Enclosure took place. (Tythe Commutation Act) when money could be paid instead of Tythes. The award was made by the Commissioners.

1834

Poor Law Amendment Act. Poor Law unions were formed as the parish was too small to have a workhouse, and settlement became less important as we had to have a Parish Union.

1838

Pluralities Act which stipulated there was to be only one living per vicar.

1840

Poor Law Guardians enforced everyone to be vaccinated.

ADDITIONAL LOCAL HISTORY, THE COLLECTION OF WROTH SILVERS

This being a curious custom held on Martinmas Eve before Sun-rising in the Hundred of Knightlow in Warwickshire.

A curious custom indeed, dating back to at least 1170. One of the last "rent paying" customs is the ancient ceremony of "Wroth Silver", held every Martinmas Eve (November 11th) at Knightlow Cross, Ryton on Dunsmore, and known to be one of the oldest continuously held ceremonies in the British Isles.

On October 24th 1926, formal notice of the ceremony was given in local papers in the following terms:-"His Grace the Duke of Buccleuch Knightlow

Wroth Silver. Notice is hereby given that the customary audit for receiving the Wroth Silver due and payable to the Duke of Buccleuch and Queensberry will be held at the Knightlow Cross, Ryton on Dunsmore on Martinmas Eve, 11th November 1926, before sun-rising, when all from whom payments are due are required to attend."

Bubbenhall, being one of the parishes in the Hundred of Knightlow, was duly represented at this years ceremony.

We woke at 6:00 to a cold, clear morning and made our way to Knightlow Hill, where we found about 50 people gathered on the small tumulus around the square, hollow stone which is all that remains of an old wayside cross.


The Duke's Agent arrived in the just dawning sky and duly read the "Charter of Assembly". The Parishes liable to pay the fee were then called out in turn, each representative stepping forward to throw the required sum into the stone - calling out "Wroth Silver" as he did so. Bubbenhalls' fee being 2 1/2 d, we found that no problem. Had we not been able to pay however, we would have been fined 20s for every penny unpaid, or forfeited a white bull with red nose and ears of the same colour!

The ceremony lasted only a few minutes, finishing just as the sun rose in a glorious sky of pink and gold.

We all then made the perilous scramble across the A45, busy now at about 7:00 a.m. and headed for the "Bull and Butcher". There we sat down to a slap up breakfast. Speeches followed with toasts to the Queen and the Duke of Buccleuch drunk in hot milk and rum. Churchwarden pipes were ceremoniously lit and smoked, (by a stalwart few), and we then headed for home, secure in the knowledge that Bubbenhall had paid it's dues for the forthcoming year.

UPDATE:-PROPOSED PARCELFORCE DEVELOPMENTAND COVENTRYAIRPORT

PARCELFORCE

The construction continues whilst we continue to wait for confirmation of the leave to appeal. As indicated previously it is very unusual for even provisional leave to be granted unless the Lords believe there is a case to be answered, we will simply have to wait for their ultimate decision.

AIRPORT

The new owners who are responsible for the running of the Consultative Committee, deferred the second Consultative Committee meeting because the room they

usually use was being refurbished and they were apparently unable to find another room large enough to accommodate the meeting. At a time when there is considerable interest regarding the plans for the Airport, even a months delay in a regularly scheduled meeting is not very helpful.

In line with the above casualness as to the importance of when consultative committee meetings take place there appears to be a continuing lack of interest in either dealing with or taking seriously the complaints of local residents. Whilst this organisation and the Parish Council can and does continue to represent your interests it may have further impact if contact is made direct

with the Airport. The Chairman of the Consultative Committee is a Mr R A K Crabtree who is on the face of it also Group Company Secretary of the owner of the Airport. Contact details are as follows:-

We have now received a response from the DETR regarding the control of night flying. The response highlights all the normal avenues that are available when it comes to securing some form of control over Airports, namely Consultative Committees, local planning authorities

and contractually binding restrictions linked to the granting of planning consents. The response goes on to say that any consideration regarding taking control of the Airport as at Heathrow, Gatwick and Stansted would be considered on its merits, having taken account of the success of the various other measures available.

Given the lack of success achieved through the measures identified above we anticipate an interesting and on going dialogue which should eventually result in proper controls being taken over what happens at Coventry Airport.

We look forward to welcoming Rainbows into the Pack in the New Year, but there is room for anyone between 7-10 years interested in joining us now.



Bubbenhall Mother & Toddler Group


