### Royal Wedding - history in the making

The maiden 'peal' attempt at Bubbenhall on Friday 29th April was successful, being completed in just 2hrs 29mins. Rung to celebrate the wedding of HRH Prince William and Catherine Middleton this was one of many peals being rung in churches around the country. However, this was particularly significant for Bubbenhall as this was the very first peal to be rung on the bells (augmented from an unringable three to six in 2000). To mark the occasion The Ringing World, the






