

What are your memories of it?

We have become aware over the last few weeks, that as we lose some of the older members of our community, a vital piece of history is lost with them. None of us is immortal and memories die when we shake off our mortal coil. We would like to collect as much information as we can from members of the community about your memories of the village, its inhabitants past and present, what do you remember of village life?

How did we get to work? Where did we work, and who for ? What did we do with our leisure time (Today there are many things that we can do, but in the past we did not have televisions or computers so what did we do?)

We take for granted the services we have today, gas, electricity, running water yet how many of you remember getting up in the morning to fill the bucket(s) from the nearest stand pipe or pump, or if you lived at the top of the village, the spout.

How many of us can remember what we called "The poo-men", can the faint hearted forgive me but these were the gentlemen had the task of collecting and disposing of the waste from our smallest rooms. People with longer memories than mine will remember this task having to be done by themselves. Is this why the older gardens produce vegetables so well?

Bubbenhall church played a much bigger part in our lives, organising trips out for the community. The vicar was one to be both respected and feared in those days. We had a bus service which actually got you into town and back quite regularly, whereas nowadays the only buses we see are those taking the children to and from

We had a butcher a post office and general stores, the mobile chippy and wet fish man called regularly. Have I not also heard talk of a cobbler and a bakery? "Hair cut sir? see Mr Hancock, top of Hancock's Hill - not the

best of experiences if my memory serves me correctly.

The village hall held all sorts of functions, dances, parties, flower shows and much more but remember, in years gone by it was at the back of The Three Horse Shoes. This along with the Malt Shovel are two of the best amenities we have -1 could of course be slightly biased as I have been known to drink on rare occasions.

What was the main employment locally, what was the housing like, the types of rents and rates? How were our personal medical needs catered for and those of our pets and livestock.

I do hope that all of the above has given you food for thought. If so, could you complete the residents survey which you will find in this copy of the newsletter and return it to one of the people named below. We would like as many residents of all age groups to participate. Hopefully, older members will be able to give us the history of the

village and how they lived, and the younger generations and newcomers will tell us how they see it now. We would also like to borrow photographs and documents which could be used along with your written accounts to create a book

FLORENCE EMILY SAYERS (Formerly BARNSLEY, nee BARRS) 1915 - 2001

My Mother.

Always Mother to me, but Mum to some of my brothers and sisters, was born 86 years ago in Corley Moor, North Warwickshire. She was the youngest of four children, Cissie, Jack, Mary and then Mother - Florence Emily, known to her family as Pemm.

Mothers mum died when mother was 7 years old. At the funeral, photographs were taken of Mother and her brother and sisters and then they were sent off separately to live with different members of the family. In those days fathers did not usually play a very active part in raising the family. My mother went to live with an Aunt on a farm at Everdon near Weedon, Northamptonshire.

Mother left school at around 14 years old and went to work in service. She met and married George Barnsley and they lived in Leamington Spa.

In 1945, our father had some savings and managed to buy some property in Bubbenhall, known as The Moat. It was around 5 acres and the house was in poor condition. They spent the next 3 years turning it into a smallholding, whilst still living in Leamington and cycling to and fro.

As was quite common practice in those days they kept pigs, and poultry etc of which my mother was very fond - she had a really good knowledge of pigs especially.

I am the youngest of the Barnsley family and when I was three weeks old in 1948 we moved to the village, along with my elder sister Cynthia, Brother George and sister Sandra.

My father had poor health and passed away in 1951. At this time my mother worked to support the family, in a retail fishmonger and greengrocer in Regent Street, Leamington Spa.

Eventually my mother remarried Lesley Sayers and they had a son, Richard. Mother lost 2 children in childhood, Sylvia Barnsley and Annette Sayers.

Mother was a determined worker with a heart of gold. In the 50s until the land was sold, mother would look after the smallholding, feeding the stock, cleaning both the pubs, and she did a lot of seasonal work for Mr Moreton, the local farmer, picking, grading planting potatoes etc.

Mealtimes were very different in those days - you weren't asked what you wanted - you were given and were very grateful for a good substantial meal every day. Some of my fondest memories of mother revolve around the mealtimes - we usually had rice pudding and Sandra and I used to fight over the dish - until we got too noisy and Mother would drop it into the washing up bowl to soak.

Another funny thing I remember was the compulsory bread and butter that we had to eat with the tinned peaches we had as a treat on Sundays. When I mentioned this to my wife in later years - it seemed the same happened to her - it must have been the accepted thing in those days.

For many years, on Sunday

afternoons, with the help of her children Mother would make cakes and sandwiches and serve tea to the cricket team that played on the village sports

In 1965, the Council purchased the majority of the land to build the Moat Close Council estate. Mother retained a small piece in the corner by the playing field, where my elder brother George, who is a time served bricklayer and carpenter built a bungalow for us.

When we lost the holding. Mother took a job at Cubbington Post Office where she worked for several years. There was no Post Office in Bubbenhall and around 1970, Mother decided she would like to open one if she could. Brother George extended the bungalow to accommodate

Mother opened Bubbenhall Post Office in 1971 and ran it until 1998 when she retired at age 83 years old.

The Post Office was unique, or maybe it was the post mistress who was unique. It provided a valuable service for the village people, with most groceries, vegetables and cards etc Mother took a great pride in the fruit and vegetables in the shop. For over 20 years, Sandra and myself went into Coventry Wholesale Market at 5.30 a.m. every Friday morning to fetch them and woe betide us if they didn't come upto mothers expectations.

Mother kept quite a display of sweets for the village children who would go into the post office to spend their pennies.

On one occasion upon seeing

Mrs Sayers walking to church, a child of the village was heard to say, "What is Mrs Sayers doing out of her shop." I think, they thought she actually lived behind the glass panelled Post Office counter.

During her time in the Post Office - our Mother had three incidents with "would be" robbers. Little did they know what they were dealing with. Although small in stature Mother had no hesitation in booting them out - despite their numbers, size, threats and even imitation guns.

On the first occasion, the would be robber persuaded her out from behind her counter, pushed something at her and told her to fill up a bag - at which she replied - "What with Young Man, Potatoes? "When she realised he was trying to rob her - she pushed him towards the door told him to "Get a Proper Job" and she had no intention of giving him any Post Office money and she would set her dog on him. This took him off guard and he fled empty handed.

On another occasion, she was conned out from the counter to serve some fruit - when they roughed her up and escaped with a small amount of cash but were caught very soon afterwards.

In 1985, Mother was awarded the Ross McWhirter Foundation Award for Bravery, and standing up for her rights.

Mother was very proud of Bubbenhall and of Bubbenhall Church, and played a very



COVENTRY & WARWICKSHIRE AIRPORT ACTION GROUP (CWAAG)

PARCELFORCE Nothing new to report

AIRPORT

At the latest consultative committee the following matters and topics came up.

The Airport operator continues to tidy up the site and has moved its own offices into one of the old hangars. A new boundary fence is being installed on the north side and the northern taxiway will be extended in due course. The new entrance is being finalised at which point car parking fees for users and visitors will be introduced.

There has been some increase in freight and training movements. The airport is to be used as a helicopter base for the Ryder Cup at the end of September. Noise complaints continued at their currently reduced rate, with the departure of the C130 the noisiest of the aircraft appears to be the DC6 and an occasional Lear jet.

Notwithstanding the airport operator's assertion that they were in negotiations with the local planners regarding development at the airport, at a meeting between Warwick's head of planning and various parish councillors this was thankfully denied.

GOVERNMENT POLICY

Currently there is a discussion document produced by the DETR reviewing the way forward for aviation development, as a recognised body CWAAG has been invited to contribute its views. In summary our view is that control needs to be legislated for, not left to good practice and voluntary arrangements, and must give legal substance to the protection of and rights of those living within the area affected by any airport. This is very much the view of the AEF a national organisation to whom most airport groups such as ours belong.


