<u>Bubbenhall Quarry Safety Incident – Please</u> <u>Stay Out of the Quarry Workings</u>


Late last year, just before Christmas, workers at the quarry found signs that someone had got into trouble in the quick sand around the silt lagoons, next to Bubbenhall Wood.

It seems a dog walker went into the area to find a lost dog. It is clear the person got in to trouble and could have drowned in the quick sand (see picture below).

It must have been a very frightening experience for dog and dog owner alike.

Since then Smiths Concrete have improved the fencing around the lagoons and put up more signage, however they ask members of the Parish to please stay out of this area and keep their dogs on a leash when walking nearby.

They believe that whoever was involved was very lucky and think nobody wants this type of incident repeated, it could have ended tragically.





Bubbenhall First Responders

The first responder scheme in Bubbenhall was established in 2013 and run by a charity called Bubbenhall First Responders.

Following several unsuccessful appeals for volunteers to help run the charity and a dip in the number of first responders an Extraordinary General Meeting was held in December 2022 to decide the charities future. At the meeting it was decided to dissolve the charity and transfer the responsibility for its assets and activities to Bubbenhall Parish Council and Coventry First Responders.

The project to transfer the public access defibrillators and the financial assets of the charity to the Parish Council has now been completed. Responsibility for supporting the one remaining first responder has been transferred to Coventry First Responders.

We are pleased to say the decision to dissolve Bubbenhall First Responders as a charity has had no impact upon the provision of services to the village.

We want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who generously supported the charity in the past. Without your support we couldn't have helped the people we did when they needed it most.

Julie's Easter Recipe

Lemon Drizzle Scones

Extras to serve:

Whipped double cream

Lemon Curd

Ingredients: Makes 8 slices

3tbsp lemon juice

3tbsp milk

225g self-raising flour

¼ tsp salt

75g butter

50g caster sugar 4tbsp lemon zest

2 eggs

300g icing sugar



Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 190C°C, line a baking tray with baking paper or grease a round oven proof dish
- 2. In a small bowl mix 1tbsp lemon juice with the milk, leave to one side
- 3. Add flour, salt & butter and rub in until mix resembles breadcrumbs.(or you can use a food processor). Add the caster sugar & 2tbsp lemon zest and mix again to combine.
- 4. In a jug or bowl beat 1 egg then stir in the milk/lemon juice. Add to the flour mix and mix briefly until everything comes together. Turn out onto a floured surface and shape into circle about 20cm across. Place on the prepared baking tray or into the oven proof dish. Using a blunt knife dipped in flour, make shallow indentations to mark the circle into 8 pieces. Beat the remaining egg and brush it over the surface. Bake for 20-25 mins, remove from oven and allow to cool completely.
- 5. In a bowl combine the icing sugar and 2tbsp lemon juice. Cut the cooled scones into 8 then drizzle the icing over the top of each piece. Sprinkle with zest. You could also add poppy seeds.
- 6. These are nice sliced and served with lemon curd and whipped cream for an extra treat.



The Three Horseshoes

In 1528 five cottages and land were purchased in Spring Hill. Bubbenhall. as a form endowment for the almshouses known as Ford's Hospital in Coventry which had been founded by William Pisford. In 1823 two of the cottages were leased to Thomas Walton, yeoman, and in 1845 these were described as of the Three Horseshoes. In the Warwickshire Directory of 1850 John Satchwell, victualler, brewer and farmer, was listed as running He and his family were recorded as living at The Three Horseshoes in the 1871 census, and he was listed as the publican 1874 Warwickshire the Directory. John was born in Bubbenhall in 1806, a member of the large Satchwell Bubbenhall family, and died there in 1881. It is difficult to trace who ran the Three Horseshoes after this, but it had been acquired by Hunt, Edmunds
