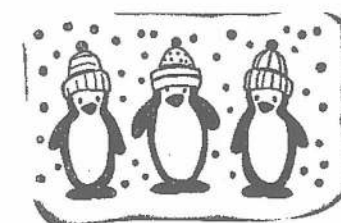

Warwickshire County Council Rural Housebound Services

The Rural Housebound Service is a partnership between the Library and Information Service and Age Concern Warwickshire and offers a free library service to housebound people living in rural areas of the county. A team of thirty volunteers assist with the selection of book and their delivery to readers throughout the county. If you live within rural Warwickshire, do not have access to transport or do not have family or friends who can regularly exchange library books for you and you are unable to visit your local library or mobile library, you may qualify for this service. Two volunteers will visit your home once a month, bringing a selection of books, stories on tape, music cassettes or jigsaws. You may request any item free of charge and we can also help you with any information enquiries. This is a free service. If you think you are eligible for this service or know of someone

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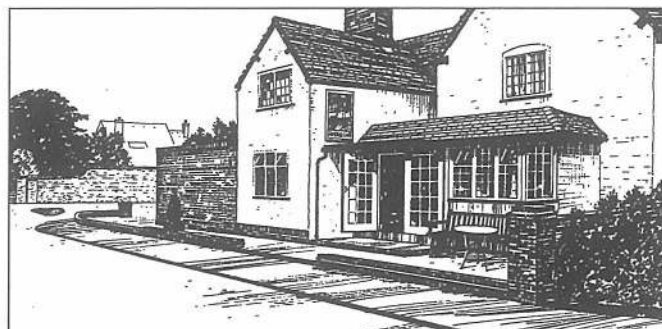

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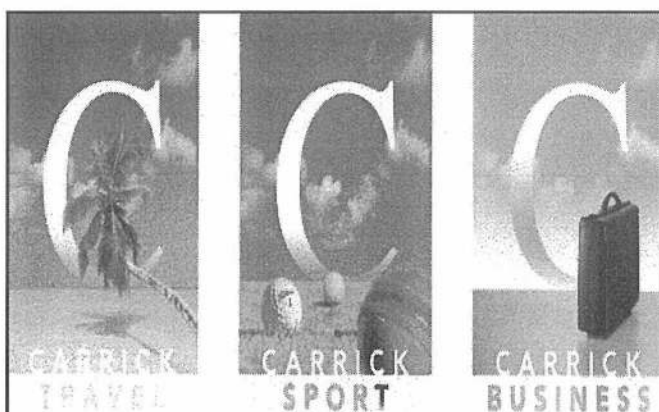
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Footpaths in Bubbenhall BBC puts Bubbenhall on the map

On Sunday 17 October BBC WM Radio organised a "Walk through Time" in Bubbenhall. 200 people came from Coventry and Warwickshire and listened to talks from experts on the history of the landscape.

The Walk took in Bubbenhall Wood and was able to show some of the quarrying currently being done by Smith's Concrete.

Experts, some with beards, brought along the huge teeth from an ice-age mammoth as well as other finds from the quarrying activities. Photos from the walk are at www.bbc.co.uk/coventry/walks/10.shtml.

This Bubbenhall walk may prove very popular in the next few months. It is the Coventry and Warwickshire choice featured in Walks Through Time on the BBC website (www.bbc.co.uk/nature) which is running alongside the eight-part BBC1 series on Wednesdays at 9 British Isles: A Natural History, presented by Alan Titchmarsh.

Over six million people watched the first two episodes. There's a book

based on the series with Alan on the cover, which is currently on sale.

To walk this route (it takes less than an hour if you start from the Three Horseshoes pub), head up Pit Hill from the Three Horseshoes, cross the Leamington Road, take the Glebe Farm track opposite, at Glebe Farm cross the bridge over Smith's Concrete's conveyor belt, head left to enter Bubbenhall Wood at the north end, walk straight through the wood and after York Farm houses turn right to follow the footpath round the western boundary of the wood, returning to Glebe Farm.

Then go back the way you came!

Note that the route has five stiles and there are patches of mud at this time of year.

Keep to the waymarked footpath at all times, and Smith's Concrete quarrying operations are out of bounds. The company will organise tours on request.

For wheelchair users, Ryton Pools Country Park offers accessible walks in a superbly restored

landscape, a car park, café and toilets.

If you want to get out and about this winter, there are plenty of alternative walks in Bubbenhall and neighbouring parishes, some involving pubs.

I shall report on this in the next issue of the Newsletter.

I won't bore you with an autobiography, but in brief I have spent the last six years working for the Forestry Commission, managing a Woodland Park in Surrey. I thoroughly enjoyed my time there and hope the experience I gained will stand me in good stead for my new post.

At the time of writing I have been in

post for about six weeks and am enjoying the work. As with any new job there is a steep learning curve to surmount, but my new colleagues have been more than willing to help push me up the slope! In succeeding Jo Lang it soon became clear that I have a hard act to follow, but I am really looking forward to the challenge. In my time here I hope to build on the existing success of the park and introduce a few ideas of my own.

Anyway, enough about me! News from the park! In order to keep up with increasing visitor numbers we are extending our car park capacity by enlarging the first car park. We will also be resurfacing the meadow car park.

Clarendon Lodge Medical Practice

Premises

At the beginning of the New Year we plan to give both downstairs and upstairs waiting areas a well deserved refurbishment. As part of this work we also plan to make some small changes to our treatment room and convert an upstairs room into an additional consulting room. These changes will benefit both you our patients and our staff and we are sure that they will make a big difference. We do hope the work does not cause too much inconvenience and ask that you bear with us during this period.

We had planned a more extensive redesign of the ground floor, to improve our facilities, especially for people with disabilities. However, after much discussion, the partners agreed that our premises have too many limitations for the longer term. Health care is changing all the time, we have an expanding team, and our present involvement in medical education is only likely to increase. The practice has therefore decided in principle to seek new premises within our existing catchment area. The next stage is to make a strong case to local NHS bodies (South Warwickshire Primary Care Trust) and to find a possible suitable site. Although we do not expect any new building to go up in the short term, we want to share our plans with you and will, of course, keep you informed of any developments in this area.

Get the Jab

Despite press reports, we still have plenty of flu jabs left! There may be shortages in some areas, so this year it will be more important than ever to protect yourselves. If you are over 65 or have a chronic condition such as asthma, diabetes, kidney problems or a heart condition please contact the reception to make an appointment.

Out of Hours Care

From 1st April 2004 GPs signed a new contract with the Government, as a result of this some changes have been made to the care of patients outside regular surgery hours. Up until 10th May of this year we have been part of Nightcall, a co-operative group staffed by GPs from the South Warwickshire area. Since that date Out of Hours Care has been provided by the Primary Care Trust. All health problems are now referred to the OOH team based at Warwick Hospital. They are dealt with in a very similar way to before. Patients are either offered telephone advice, an appointment to see the doctor, or a home visit by an Emergency Care Practitioner. The standard of care is high and we do not anticipate any difficulties for our patients in this setting. If you have any problems that arise with your health that cannot wait until routine surgery hours call 01926 600090.

Appointments

As a reminder although around 75 – 80% of our doctor appointments are only released on the day, the remainder can be booked in advance. We also now offer advance booking appointments as early as 8.00 a.m. Another improvement in our service is the provision of telephone appointments for problems which do not necessarily require a “face to face” consultation. These can be booked via reception and mean that the doctor will phone you back as close as possible to an allocated time.

We would just like to point out that if you do not attend for your pre-booked appointment and phone the surgery to apologise, you may still receive a letter in the post. A missed appointment can cause inconvenience to both the doctor/nurse and to other patients who we could have offered your appointment to.

Childhood Vaccinations

Childhood vaccinations have been improved and the new safer vaccinations will be available from 27th September 2004. Children will no longer receive polio vaccine by mouth as it has been combined into a new ‘5 in 1’ injection. This offers the same level of protection against polio without the tiny risk of paralysis associated with the old vaccine by mouth. **Oral polio is no longer available anywhere.** The pertussis (whooping cough) part of the injection has also been improved. It still stimulates the immune system of the child sufficiently to ensure they have the same protection against the disease but with fewer side effects, particularly sore injection sites. None of the new vaccines given to children contain mercury. The vaccines are given to children at the same ages as before and children can complete their immunisations course with the new vaccines even if it has been started with the old ones. Over recent years there has been much controversy about vaccinations which has caused many parents great concern. All staff at Clarendon Lodge Medical Practice believe it is essential that all children are fully immunised. This is based on current research and the advice of the medical advisors. More information may be obtained from www.immunisation.nhs.uk and your doctor, the nurse and health visitors would be happy to answer your questions.

Airport

The previous few months have been quite eventful. Firstly with the events of September 11th bringing a huge boost to the campaign. After successfully delaying the planning permission for the new terminal for two years events came to a head with a planning decision held at Leamington Town Hall on the 11th September. This was to prove to be a very long and tiring day with speakers for and against the airport and the planning officers recommendations. After a difficult day when at times we felt the decision would go against us the planning committee decided to reject the airports application on numerous accounts.

Naturally the airport appealed against this decision and it has now been called in by the government for a public enquiry which is to tie in with the enforcement orders placed on the temporary terminal scheduled to start on the 1st February 2005. This means that from the initial application to the government hearing we will have effectively delayed the terminal building work by at least two and a half years.

Naturally it has been a long process with lots of time and effort to achieve this. We are very pleased that we have delayed it this long, however to some degree it is now out of our hands and is possibly now part of the government plan. Unfortunately we cannot truly know which way the government will go. Although naturally any letters that you can send will help boost our case.

In addition to this and as we have come to accept from Tui/Thompson in the last few weeks they have submitted plans for a terminal building three and a half times larger than the original application. They say that this is because the original application had insufficient car parking spaces, which is something we were telling them eighteen months ago. It is also coupled with increased customs and excise requirements.

It is very early days regarding the new application and we are currently focusing our time on presenting a case for the public enquiry.

Finally my thanks to everybody who has carried the fight forward recently as I have spent less time than usual due to work commitments.

Bubbenhall Broadband Update

It's a long story – this is the very short version !

Bubbenhall could not get broadband because we were just beyond BT's limit of 6km from the Tollbar exchange.

We spent a lot of time exploring satellite and wireless options, which resulted in a successful site survey during August from a company called Internet Access Point (IAP) who would have been our provider.

However, in June BT announced that they were running trials in Milton Keynes to re-establish their current limits for ADSK technology. These trials proved successful.

From September online availability checkers were updated and the 6km reach limit for 512kbps broadband services was removed. BT also increased the range for 1Mbps premium services from 4km to approximately 6km.

The removal of these restrictions means that you can now place an order for the 512Kbps broadband through your chosen service provider. Please note that all orders are subject to survey and in some cases an engineer may need to visit.

Quite a number of homes throughout the village are now successfully using broadband and we are no longer looking into alternative wireless/satellite options.

Thank you for your interest in bringing broadband to Bubbenhall. There will of course not be any further updates in the Newsletter.

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gates and stiles with metal ones when appropriate. This debate will continue, and should you have any views on the footpaths around Bubbenhall please pass them to me and these will be conveyed to the county officers.

Earlier this year the Kenilworth Footpath Preservation Group and Ian Henderson did a mornings work in Bubbenhall. Specifically, they improved stiles and renewed way marking at Quarryfield, Weston Lane, Riverside, The Slades, Broomhill Farm and Waverly Edge. The group collaborates with the county's Recreation and Countryside Department in maintaining and improving rights of way in the Kenilworth area, organising, work parties once a month.

Coventry Airport Update

Things have been changing fast in the last few months and some of the planning issues are getting complex, so a brief update is appropriate with this input bring provided by John Border who has been the spokesperson for the Parish Council over recent months.

You may recall, back in April, Warwick District Council served two enforcement notices on the 'Interim Passenger Facility' (IPF), the portacabins the airport is currently using as a passenger terminal. Those notices required the airport to cease using the IPF. The airport claimed they did not have to apply for planning permission, but WDC disagreed. The airport appealed against those enforcement notices, one of their grounds of appeal effectively being a retrospective planning application. In the meantime the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister decreed that the IPF was indeed 'unauthorised development' as WDC had said all along, and required the airport to carry out and submit an Environmental Impact Assessment

into the IPF. The airport submitted this in mid October. A Public inquiry is now due to start on 1 Feb 2005. Bubbenhall PC has given support to the 'Community group', a collective of objectors who will appear at the inquiry, led by Baginton PC.

Separately Warwick District Council heard the planning application for the permanent passenger terminal in September. The council rejected the application on five main grounds, as well as being directed to refuse by the Highways Agency, on traffic impact grounds. An appeal against the WDC refusal has subsequently been made by the airport, who are pushing to get the issues merged into the February Enforcement Inquiry. Merging the inquiries should be resisted as it will delay outcome of enforcement until the end of 2005 at the earliest, and overcomplicate the inquiry with different issues. In addition the short timescale remaining between now and then to prepare a case will give significant advantage to airport

More worryingly, in the last few weeks the airport have confirmed they now intend to submit a new planning application for a passenger terminal 20 times the size of the one now in operation, and 3.5 times the size of the one rejected already by WDC. They also wish to add a 3,500 space car park. Their expansion ambitions are starting to become clear...

I am now attending the airport consultative committee meetings. I am able to raise any issues that you think need to be taken up with the airport. Let me know on jborder@supanet.com or drop me a note at 20 Coopers Walk.

We still await the outcome of enforcement action relating to a new gateway into one of the above fields but the local planning authority has recently sent the following update as a result of the council's request to review.

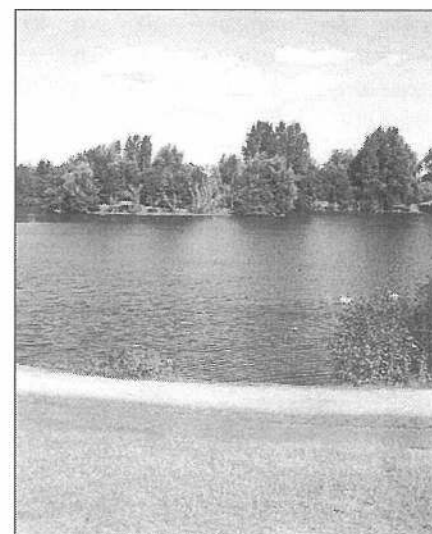
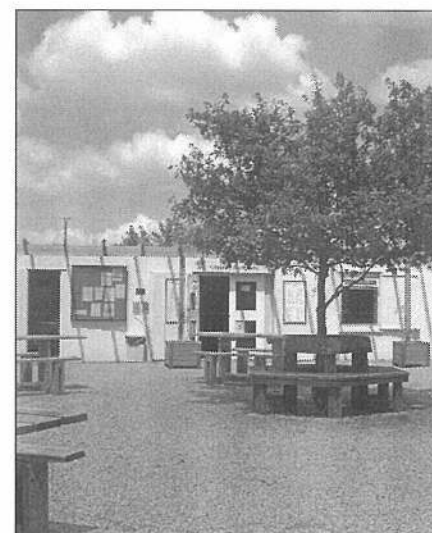
The Café is open 364 days a year (core opening hours are 10:30 to 15:00) closed Christmas Day.

Bubbenhall Village Hall

The main activities of the Hall are reported separately in this Newsletter by the various user groups. This is just a quick update on where things stand as regards the possible re-opening of a limited

Post-Office service in the Hall. Arrangements are now well advanced. Post-Office Ltd has agreed in principle that we can run a service for at least one morning a week as a satellite of the Ryton Post-Office. Gill Green will run the service thereby providing continuity with the previous PO on Lower End. We have been in contact with the Charity Commission to ensure that our charitable status is not

compromised by the receipt of rent for this purpose. The Post-Office will need to undertake some cabling installations in the second kitchen to support the necessary communications facilities, and will also provide the necessary security arrangements. We have had constructed a moveable counter that can roll into the door-opening to the kitchen when the Post-Office is in use. There is a remaining problem of where this counter gets stored when not in use but we expect to solve that shortly – please bear with us while we do.

the enforcement investigation file (ENF 382/38/03) has remained open and enquiries have been made to encourage the re-instatement of the land to its form appearance. The applicant involved with W03/1865 (Mr Kemp) has claimed that he is no longer involved with the site and a land registry search has recently been carried out to confirm ownership details. Once this is known efforts will continue.

My views on the two issues raised are:

(a) Assuming the current land ownership is reasonably established then there is some possibility of formal enforcement action being taken to require the land to be returned to its former levels etc. The creation of the earth bunds by the stripping of the top soil represents an engineering operation which could be considered to represent 'development' and as not required for agricultural purposes represents a breach of planning control. In association with any formal legal action which is taken there are rights of appeal available to the landowner to the Planning Inspectorate.

(b) The responsibility to avoid illegal development taking place principally is with the landowner. In this instance my understanding is that the site is securely fenced and gated to prevent unrestricted access onto the land and therefore at the current time there is nothing which needs to be done by the Planning Authority. Any future use of the site by travellers would be dealt with by various agencies and Environmental Health would be the lead Dept and has experience in working in close liaison with the Police in these situations. I have no reason to

support the Parish Council's concern that this site may be targeted by travellers.

I trust that this has provided you with some clarification over the current position.

Phil Duncan of Smiths Concrete recently gave a presentation of a proposal for the transformation of the Village Spout and gardens that made use of recycled water pumped from the village pond and from any natural spring water that still ran into the spout. The latest response has been that 'Ken' (the forester) is going to arrange for the cherry trees to be sorted out as quickly as he can. If he doesn't, I shall just get them removed a.s.a.p.' Neighbourhood Watch

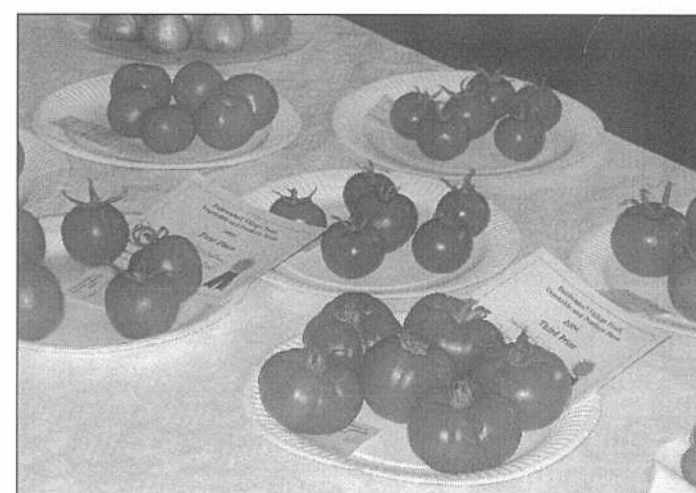
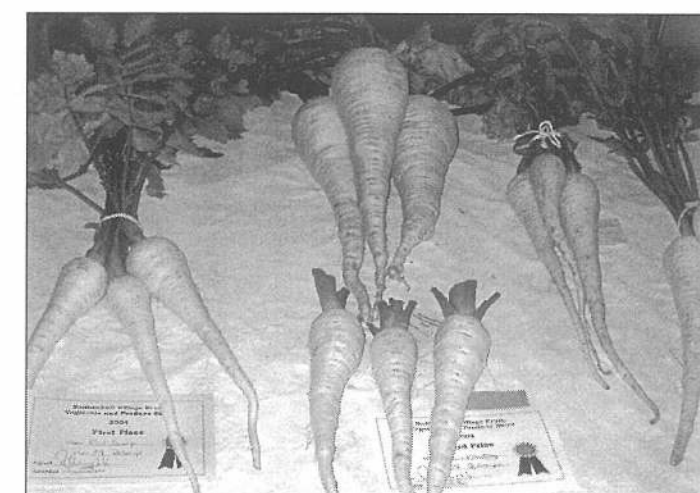
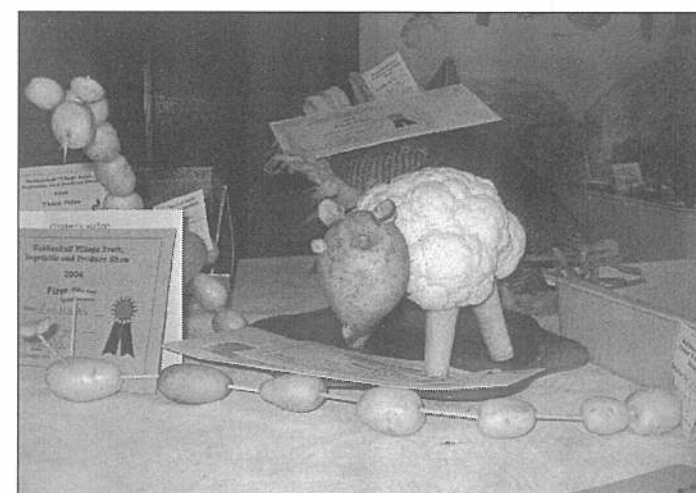
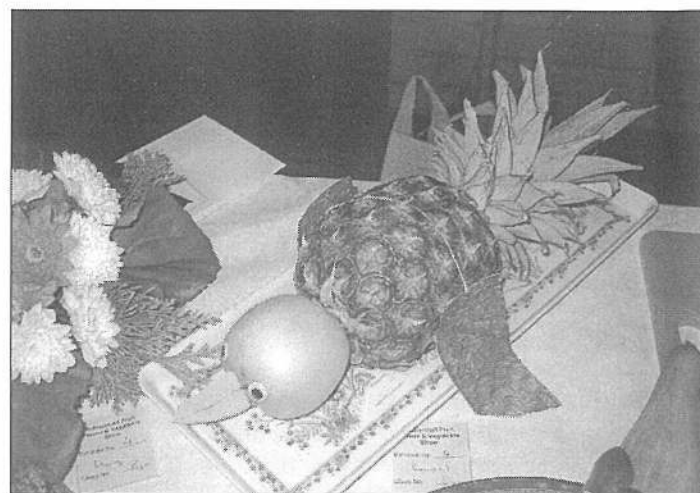
