Provost Williams Primary School. The Bubbenhall site is now an 'annexe' to the main school site in Ryton. It may be that the Bubbenhall Annexe is once again under threat of closure. Provost Williams School Governors recently issued an Action Plan, produced in response to the schools Ofsted

report. The Ofsted Inspectors identified several key issues for action. The first being, that the head teachers, governors and staff should "make more effective use of financial resources and accommodation available to the school by rationalising them against its long term strategic needs." To address this issue the action plan states that there will be a review of the school structure. Should this review conclude

that maintaining the Bubbenhall Annexe is not cost effective, the annexe could be closed as a matter of course.

This review is due to be completed by December. As we understand it at the moment, closure of the Annexe would be a decision taken by the School Governors not the County Council, and there would be little opportunity to fight or appeal against the decision. No one wishes to pre-empt the results of the school structure review, but all villagers should be alert to the possibility of closure and the adverse effects this would have on the village.

Bubbenhall is also adversely effected by the uncontrolled development of Coventry Airport. Parish Councillor Tony Marson has been fighting to get

the authorities to recognise this fact. His report details the continuing efforts being made to fight the Parcelforce development and obtain a proper assessment of the Airports environmental impact on surrounding villages.

The newsletter committee are keen to help in raising local issues and reporting on local events. Please contact a member of the committee by the 5th November with items for the next edition. Addresses are on the back cover.

On a lighter note, you will notice that the Bubbenhall bunnies are back, they have all been on holiday at 25 Home Close with the Ciuffini family. but the food was terrible !. See if you can find them all, it won't be easy.

PARCELFORCE

Leave to appeal the decision, given in favour of the Secretary of State, has been provisionally granted and includes the suggestion that the matter should be the subject of reference to the European Courts. This was given just prior to the House of Lords breaking for the summer holidays. Their further consideration of the matter will take place in October, when we expect their initial decision to be confirmed. Notwithstanding the facts that planning permission for the Parcelforce development has been granted and Parcelforce have started construction, this is very significant.

It is very unusual for even provisional leave to be granted unless the Lords believe there is a case to be answered.

Parcelforce are on notice that they proceed at their own risk, which is not insubstantial and in the event, from our point of view, of a successful hearing, the Judicial Review of Warwick District Councils decision will follow.

We continue to be advised, that we should ultimately be successful in our assertion that an Environmental Assessment should have taken place. In which case the granting of planning permission will prove

to have been unlawful and Parcelforce will have spent millions on what may well turn out to be unusable for their intended purposes. All due to Warwick District Council and their extraordinary decision. that such a development was not likely to lead to significant environmental effect.

AIRPORT

The new owners are now in possession and whilst they continue the Consultative Committee, whose first meeting has taken place, it is not very encouraging that after two months they had been unable to produce a new constitution or indicate what they anticipate doing with the Airport to stem its losses. It may be early days, but it is hard to believe that any company takes on a loss maker without being pretty sure how they will turn it

We await formal response regarding the control of night flying. As with the Lords, holidays interrupt.

Whilst Parcelforce have started and continue with their development, substantial progress has been made which should lead to securing the quality of the lives of the thousands of residents living in the effected

SNIPPETS OF **VILLAGE HISTORY**

Before carrying on from 1726, it may be of interest to know that the mill was owned by the monks of Kenilworth Priory until the dissolution in 1558, and in 1510 the Priory leased the mill and farm to William Smith for 48 shillings and 6d /annum.

The last owner of the mill was George Moore who ran it from 1892 to 1950. It then became derelict and was demolished in 1964 to improve the river. 'Riverside' house was built in 1967.

In 1726 after the Parliamentary Enclosures there was only the Lord of the Manor, the church, John Murcott, John Busby, John Bear and George and Mary Paggett as land owners. So of the 12 families in the Village in 1694, only 6 survived into the second half of the 1700's.

The church owned 111 acres. the Lord of the Manor (William Davenport Bromley) owned 591 acres, and in fact the Glebelands (church lands) were leased to the Lord of the Manor during the 19th Century.

see stocked, John or Gill will be pleased to obtain them for you. Gill also offers a wide range of services from the Post Office. As well as your stamps, TV licence, pensions, postal orders etc. you can now get general household insurance, income protection insurance, life assurance and travel insurance. For those foreign holidays, you can obtain travellers cheques or foreign currency which can be purchased with credit card, cheque or cash. This service has been extremely popular over the summer!

For special occasions, Flowers by Post can be ordered. Samples of bouquets available will be on display on Saturday 12th September. A copy of the Bubbenhall Parish map can also be viewed and prints can be purchased at a cost of £12.50 each.

photocopying done at the Post Office and documents can be faxed for you:- please ensure that you have the correct fax number with you. Prescriptions can also be sent by fax to a pharmacy in Leamington Spa. The dispensed medicines will then be returned to Gill and can be collected from the stores on the same evening.

- 2. Liaised with Manoj Sonecha of Warwick District Council Sports Development Section, to cover matters associated with setting up a voluntary sports club/session, and have received some equipment in the form of balls and cones.
- 3. Applied for some funding to cover initial set-up costs.

I am now looking to set up soccer sessions to run for one and a half hours on Saturday mornings, initially just for children of the village between the ages of 5-11. The sessions, for a maximum of 16 children. will involve about 20 minutes of soccer skills training followed by an hour of 'mini-soccer'. I am looking to run sessions based on the mini-soccer idea currently being promoted by the Football Association. Mini soccer has been researched, piloted and developed as the most appropriate introduction to football for boys and girls aged between 5 and 11 years old.

Please can I ask any parents who would like further details, or would like to reserve places for their children to contact me by Sunday the 20th September. Also, if there are any parents interested in helping to run the sessions, you will be more than welcome, and the District Council may be able to offer you places on training courses for football coaching and working with children.


VICKI'S EUROPEAN **JAIL-BREAK 1998**

When the morning of the 31st of July finally came, after five months of fund-raising and preparing I didn't know whether to laugh or cry. Me and nine other girls I barely even knew, were about to take part in the most exciting journey of our lives. A mad trip around 7 European countries in just 15 days - were we crazy??

Us, the Hyenas, and 2 other groups of 10 girls had been set various challenges to do in Europe. We left Midland Headquarters in Ashby-de-la-Zouch, and had a mad rush to Birmingham International Station. It felt like we were film stars what with ten sets of parents flashing cameras here and there. We caught various trains, including the London Underground in the morning rush hour, down to Dover where we caught the Sea Cat to Oostende, Belgium.

Over the next two weeks we visited seven different countries, and as well as completing our given challenges we had loads of fun and walked miles with really attractive backpacks on our backs. In Belgium we ate chocolates, visited the battle of Waterloo, (including walking up the 226 steps to get to it!), and saw the really famous 'weeing man' statue, (don't worry I hadn't heard of it either!!)

Next stop was Holland where we rode bikes, saw windmills and stayed in a youth hostel which happened to be on the only hill in the country. We also went to the brilliant Berger Zoo, and the 'open air museum' where I bought a pair of clogs. Next onto Germany. We ate traditional German sausage, visited the Brandenburg gate and saw just how much difference there was between the two sides of Germany. We stopped over in



Munchen to see the Glockenspiel strike on our way to Switzerland hopping though Austria on the way. This meant we had breakfast in Germany, lunch in Austria and tea in Switzerland. We met Helen, a girl in my groups cousin at the train station, who took us to look at Lake Geneva. We went back to her house for a typically Swiss meal of melted cheese, potatoes and pickles. We also had a quick dip in their swimming pool!. We stayed in a local scout hut for the night and caught the very early train to Lausanne and across the south of France to the French Alps. We were greeted by the most beautiful scenery and discovered that our youth hostel was actually up Mont Blanc itself which meant a long trek up hill with our backpacks now even heavier with souvenirs in. By use of cable cars and trams we travelled up Mont Blanc where we visited mer de glace, a glacier in the side of Mont Blanc. This was very worth the long trek with backpacks as it was my

favourite part of the whole trip! Very tired by now we headed to Spain. We got to Barcelona in the middle of a heat wave, with temperatures reaching over 100°C. We spent a morning visiting churches and museums but the weather was very hot, and as it was Helen's birthday we decided just to hit the beach. The beach we went to was man made for when Barcelona hosted the Olympics for the athletes to relax at. We ate paella and loads of ice creams, and relaxed before our next hectic journey through France.

We visited Cognac, going to the Martell vineyards and then headed up to Paris. Our youth hostel had over nine floors and looked more like a flat rather than a vouth hostel. We visited, and climbed the Eiffel Tower, lit a candle in Notre Dame. and tried a local French cheese. Paris was our last night together, and as we had become like ten best friends we wanted to do something special. We had a posh meal out, (well we had a

pizza), and went on a moonlit boat trip on the River Seine. It was a great way to say good-bye to Jailbreak. The next morning we were met by the other two groups and Pat Taff under the Eiffel Tower, and Jailbreak officially ended -sob! We had a long and tearful journey home, and finally reached Birmingham at 12:45 a.m. with a lot of memories, and aching shoulders.

I would just like to thank everyone who helped me to fundraise for my trip. Many people helped me from face painting to donations, and I also had a lot of support especially from my mum. Without this help I would not have been able to go, and have the absolutely wonderful time that I had. Over the past few years we have been busy developing a junior section at Hunningham Cricket Club. This season has seen the under 11, and under 13 sides establish themselves as forces to be reckoned with in the local cricket leagues. Hunningham juniors attracts a large number of children from the surrounding villages, and Bubbenhall is no exception, with six lads representing the club at different levels. Due to the success of our junior section we have been awarded National Lottery funding. This has enabled us to build all weather training and playing facilities at the ground.

During the season the youth teams competed in over twenty five matches for the club. The under 11 side played in the Lord Taverners Trophy, three matches played during one day at Leamington Cricket Ground. Although they lost to the finalists Kenilworth Wardens they did notch the highest score of the day, a total of 99.

There were a number of good victories during the season with two notable wins by the under 13 side. At Warwick C.C. they won by 10 wickets with the help of some tight bowling by Daniel Kingham from Bubbenhall. Then at Dorridge C.C with four Bubbenhall lads in the team, they chased a score of 79 and won with a four off of the penultimate ball of the match.

Another pleasing win was when a very young Hunningham side beat Sphinx of Coventry with two Bubbenhall lads, Sam Dodds and James Hands bowling exceptionally well, the latter taking 2 important wickets.

One of the high points of the season was the selection of four lads from Hunningham to represent Central Warwickshire under 12 team. They included Mike Dodds and Chris Long from Bubbenhall, who played in four 35 over games during July, and have been retained for further coaching.

The representative game between Warwickshire and Middlesex under 13 teams at Hunningham was a great success. Middlesex were the eventual winners by 22 runs.

The weather kept fine, and over 400 runs were scored on an excellent wicket. We have already been informed that we have been selected to host another Warwickshire Youth fixture next season (they like our teas).

Finally we hope to expand next year with the addition of an under 15 side, so if there are any budding cricketers out there, Hunningham needs you. With the season drawing to an end we are looking forward to a well earned rest before winter nets begin on the second Sunday in January 1999.




