NEWS FROM THE TOWER

The decades of silence from the tower of St. Giles is now at an end.

The dream to restore the bells at St Giles, instigated by Reverend Trevor Sykes and Mr Harry Windsor, is now a reality.

Bubbenhall originally had a ring of three bells. Unfortunately the frames and bearings had long been unserviceable and in need of major overhaul. Indeed one of the bells was known to have such poor tonal qualities that its reuse was unlikely.

In conjunction with Taylor s of Loughborough and Kenneth Holmes Associates of Coventry, the original installation has been carefully removed and provision made for a Ring of Six at a lower position in the tower.

Two of the original bells were taken to Taylors, the third bell being retained high up in the tower for use by the clock strike.

Of the two removed, the Tenor

Bell, (Bagley 1670), weighing in at around 6 cwt. is being re-tuned before returning to St. Giles. The other bell (Mears 1813) has been melted down and used as part of four new bells which have now been successfully cast. The sixth bell joining our tower is from Little Packington.

Many parishioners were able to go to Taylors to view the casting in August and all agreed it was very interesting. History in the making!

Bell ringing practice is going well. After having mastered bell control on tied (quiet!) bells, we are now progressing to ringing Rounds on open (noisy!) bells. We still have a long way to go, but this is where the hard work of the last few months (years) pays off. Very soon now St Gile s church will once again Ring the Changes across the countryside, following the traditional pattern of centuries.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Since our last report several instances of crime have been reported — a case of burglary where entry was gained through an open transome window and an amount of money stolen and during the same night an attempt was made on another property which was unsuccessful fortunately. Three garden sheds have also been broken into and two bags of golf clubs and a mower stolen. We can only repeat our previous advice on how to make things more difficult for the thief by ensuring we take all possible steps to protect our property, such as fitting burglar alarms if possible (a nuisance I know when they go off unnecessarily without apparent cause), fitting door and window locks and keeping all doors locked, even when occupied as there are many case reported to the

police of sneak-in thefts. It is also very important to ensure all windows on the ground level and even those above flat roofs are kept closed at night to prevent illegal entry. Garden sheds and outhouses are also being targeted by thieves and, as mentioned before, valuable property stolen. Garden ornaments and valuable shrubs and trees have also been removed from some properties although only one burglary and one attempt have been reported in Bubbenhall the police have informed me that many more cases have been reported in surrounding areas. It behoves us all to be ever vigilant and report any suspicious person, vehicle or thing to the police at

- 3. There is talk about charter aircraft transfering from other airports to operate out of

4. Some changes to the original planning agreement are being sought (s106) these appear to have more significance for those living on the north side of the airport. However as

there do not appear to have been any fundamental changes since the original agreement was signed, we are seeking to resist any change.


